## About the Speakers

**LORD AVEBURY** serves as president of the PSG and is a long-standing human rights advocate. He is a member of the Liberal Democrat Foreign Affairs team and founder of the Parliamentary Human Rights Group. In 2000 he travelled to Peru as part of a parliamentary delegation organised by the Peru Support Group.

**JOHN CRABTREE** is a research associate of Oxford University's Latin America Centre. He has authored several books on contemporary politics in the Andean region, including his most recent title *Fractured Politics: Peruvian Democracy Past and Present*. He has worked as a consultant and translator for a number of agencies, including the World Bank, the Inter-American Development Bank and the Organisation of American States.

**NATALIA SOBREVILLA** is lecturer and head of Hispanic studies at the University of Kent. Her research interests include state formation and political culture in the Andes as well as issues of identity, ethnicity and military culture in nineteenth and twentieth century South America.

**PAULO DRINOT** is senior lecturer in Latin American history at the Institute for the Study of the Americas (ISA) in the University of London. His main research focus is the economic, social, political and cultural history of Peru in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, on which he has published widely in both Spanish and English.

**JESSICA BUDDS** is lecturer in environment and development at the University of Reading. She has worked extensively on issues of water use and the extractive industries in the Peruvian Andes.

**ROSEMARY THORP** is an emeritus fellow of St Antony's College, Oxford University and is the former director of the university's Latin American Centre. Between 2001 and 2006 she also served as chair of trustees of Oxfam GB. In 2008 she was awarded an honorary doctorate by the Catholic University of Peru, a C.B.E. in the 2009 new year's honours list, and an honorary professorship at the Universidad del Pacifico, Lima in 2010. While formally retired, she is still active in research and recently published a book on ethnicity and inequality in Peru.

**JAMES COPESTAKE** was appointed professor of international development the University of Bath in 2010. He is currently also associate dean for the faculty of humanities and social sciences. His teaching includes courses in the economics of development and in development finance. He has lived in Peru and recently edited a book on issues of wellbeing and development in the country.

**DIEGO MOYA-OCAMPOS** is the Peru analyst at IHS Global Insight. He previously worked as a lawyer in Venezuela as well as a legal consultant for the Office of the Mayor of the Chacao Municipality and as Chief Secretary at the Venezuelan Attorney-General's Office.

**GUSTAVO GORRITI** is an internationally acclaimed Peruvian journalist who has written widely on society, politics in culture in both Peru and the wider Latin America region. Having exposed a series of political scandals in the early 1990s he was kidnapped by the Fujimori government and held captive for two days. He today runs the Peruvian non-profit organisation *IDL Reporteros* where he supervises a number of upcoming investigative journalists.

**ISABEL CRABTREE CONDOR** is an Anglo-Peruvian journalist working on Latin American politics with expertise in natural resource management.
